The Bishops of England and Wales have decided to cease having public liturgies in our churches and chapels. Since the Church finds herself in this difficult situation because of the Coronavirus, the obligation for the faithful to attend Mass on a Sunday or Holy Day of Obligation is removed until further notice.

The Second Sunday of Easter

During a 'normal' Easter we are called by the Church to gather together, to celebrate the resurrection of Jesus, son of the living God and to be full of joy for the new life God offers us all. But this 'liturgical' time does not really correspond to how most of us are situated in life's journey at the moment!

You get an echo in St Peter's letter (today's second reading of the bulletin) when he writes "This is a cause of great joy for you, even though you may for a short time have to bear being plagued by all sorts of trials; so that when Jesus Christ is revealed, your faith will have been tested and proved like gold...." We can sometimes find it difficult to believe in the triumph of life over death, of joy over sadness in the present circumstances of 'lockdown' and fear of illness.

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Perhaps, therefore, we will find it easy to identify with Thomas in today's gospel. We heard how Thomas was missing when the risen Lord came to the upper room where the other disciples were in 'lockdown'. Thomas simply could not believe. The darkness of Good Friday was still too raw for Thomas and prevented him from seeing beyond the reality of his Master's horrific death.

Like Thomas, we can sometimes struggle to identify fully with those whose faith seems so much more assured than ours. Do you remember Jairus whose daughter seemed dead saying to Jesus "Lord, I believe, help my unbelief." What is so reassuring is Our Lord's response to the doubts of Thomas. When Jesus appeared to Thomas, He did not rebuke him. His first words were "Peace be with you". Jesus invited Thomas to touch his wounds as he had requested and then to "doubt no longer but believe." It was then that Thomas made one of the most complete professions of faith in the four gospels. "My Lord and my God." What this is telling you and me is that serious doubt and great faith can reside in one and the same person.

Jesus then pointed beyond those who could physically see and believe who, of course remained small in number to the likes of you and me "Blessed are those who have not seen and yet believe." The same message is conveyed by St Peter in today's second reading "You did not see Him, yet you love Him." We all look forward in hope to seeing Christ Jesus face to face but for now we only see dimly like a mirror.

If we keep looking, keep searching the risen Lord will reveal Himself to us, even in this present crisis. He can reveal Himself in the silence of our own home, 'be still and know I am God'. He could reveal Himself in the kindness of another person to us, the Lord uses other people as His instruments of loving care. Other peoples' faith can help our own to grow.

There is light in the darkness, new life emerging from death. We are never alone because the risen Lord is closer to us than we even are to ourselves!



THE WORD

Year A • Psalter Week 2



DISCIPLES BECOME APOSTLES

(JOHN 20:19-31)

In the first scene of our Gospel reading today, the risen Jesus reveals himself to his fearful disciples: he breathes the Holy Spirit onto them and sends them to continue his mission.

Up to this point in the Fourth Gospel, the disciples have had no share in Jesus' ministry, and their faith in him has been incomplete. They have heard from Mary Magdalene that the Lord is risen, but now they have experienced him for themselves. Their reaction of being filled with joy tells us that they have accepted the truth of the resurrection and so their journey from conditional to unconditional faith is accomplished. They are to witness to Jesus now that he is no longer with them physically.

This Gospel passage is not so much concerned with the historical disciples themselves as with those who will come to believe through their word. Hence the figure of Thomas represents those who will be told by others about Jesus, but will find it hard to believe: they will only accept the message after questioning and searching without having a visual experience of Jesus. So the words Jesus speaks underline this, when he pronounces the one beatitude we find in the Fourth Gospel: "Happy are those who have not seen and yet believe." ■

SAY

Happy are those who
have not seen and yet
believe!

(John 20:29)

DO

As you leave the church, and your home, imagine a sign above the door which says, "Welcome to your mission field!"

LEARN

The forgiving or retaining of sins mentioned in today's Gospel refers to the person accepting or declining baptism.

Thomas' scepticism has a positive result: it leads him to an encounter with the risen Lord.

To believe in Jesus is ultimately a personal decision.

REFLECT

Many parents find it hard when their children give up the practice of the faith. Despite their best efforts, there comes a point when the younger ones decide that what they have been taught either does not make sense to them or that it does not matter. Even very young children can decide that organised religion is not for them. There are many reasons why people give up the outward expression of the faith into which they were baptised, probably as an infant: in the past, there were certain social pressures to go to church which do not exist any more.

Sometimes we hear talk about whether the activity of the Church (or parish) is best described as "mission or maintenance". The model which Jesus gives in the Gospel today is mission: his disciples are not to stay in the place where they are and celebrate their belief in him simply among themselves, but they are to go out and spread his message. Those who accept freely their witness will signify this outwardly by being baptised and thus having their sins forgiven and living the Easter life of the risen Lord. No one can make this decision for anyone else. No catechetical

programme can guarantee success: all we can do is to present what we believe and entrust the result to the Holy Spirit.

There is obviously a hunger among people for a deeper meaning in life. Very often, the interest of someone who enquires about the faith is sparked off by meeting someone who is committed and who gives the impression of having found such a meaning. We do not have to leave home to be missionary disciples: the mission field is all around us. ■

SECOND READING

1 Peter 1:3-9

A reading from the first letter of St Peter.

Blessed be God the Father of our Lord Jesus Christ, who in his great mercy has given us a new birth as his sons, by raising Jesus Christ from the dead, so that we have a sure hope and the promise of an inheritance that can never be spoilt or soiled and never fade away, because it is being kept for you in the heavens. Through your faith, God's power will guard you until the salvation which had been prepared is revealed at the end of time. This is a cause of great joy for you, even though you may for a short time have to bear being plagued by all sorts of trials; so that, when Jesus Christ is revealed, your faith will have been tested and proved like gold – only it is more precious than gold, which is corruptible even though it bears testing by fire – and then you will have praise and glory and honour. You did not see him, yet you love him; and still without seeing him, you are already filled with joy so glorious that it cannot be described, because you believe; and you are sure of the end to which your faith looks forward, that is, the salvation of your souls.

GOSPEL

John 20:19-31

A reading from the holy Gospel according to John.

In the evening of that same day, the first day of the week, the doors were closed in the room where the disciples were, for fear of the Jews. Jesus came and stood among them. He said to them, "Peace be with you," and showed them his hands and his side. The disciples were filled with joy when they saw the Lord, and he said to them again, "Peace be with you.

"As the Father sent me,
so am I sending you."

After saying this he breathed on them and said:

"Receive the Holy Spirit.
For those whose sins you forgive,

they are forgiven;
for those whose sins you retain,
they are retained."

Thomas, called the Twin, who was one of the Twelve, was not with them when Jesus came. When the disciples said, "We have seen the Lord," he answered, "Unless I see the holes that the nails made in his hands and can put my finger into the holes they made, and unless I can put my hand into his side, I refuse to believe." Eight days later the disciples were in the house again and Thomas was with them. The doors were closed, but Jesus came in and stood among them. "Peace be with you," he said. Then he spoke to Thomas, "Put your finger here; look, here are my hands. Give me your hand; put it into my side. Doubt no longer but believe." Thomas replied, "My Lord and my God!" Jesus said to him:

"You believe because you can see me.

Happy are those who have not seen and yet believe."

There were many other signs that Jesus worked and the disciples saw, but they are not recorded in this book. These are recorded so that you may believe that Jesus is the Christ, the Son of God, and that believing this you may have life through his name.
